Greer Recreation Association Board Meeting Minutes
April 26, 2018

Location: Greer City Hall, 301 E. Poinsett St., Greer, SC 29651

I. Call to Order

Wayne Yount (Chairman) called to order the regular meeting of the Greer Recreation Association Board at 6:20pm on April 26, 2018 at Greer City Hall, Hall A.

The following members of the Board of Trustees attended:

John Bohannon, Amanda Hopper, Wayne Yount, Pamela Taylor, Charles Ryan and Marc Metcalf.

Others Present: Ann Cunningham (Director), Ashlyn Stone (Events Supervisor), Justin Miller (Recreation Supervisor), Travis Durham (Grounds Maintenance Superintendent), Cory Holtzclaw (Athletic Supervisor), Robin Byouk (Cultural Arts Supervisor), Sally Wise (Administrative Assistant), Andy Burleigh (DAV) and Barbara Bohley (Cultural Arts Adhoc Representative).

Councilwoman Kimberly Bookert appointed Amanda Hopper to the Recreation Association Board representing District 3. Ann Cunningham introduced and welcomed Amanda Hopper to the Recreation Association. Amanda is employed at Hopper Financial and resides on Lemon Creek Drive in Lyman.

- a) No Adhoc Committee reports were presented.

VII. Departmental Questions/Discussions

- a) **Athletics Division** – Cory Holtzclaw, Athletic Supervisor

- The 2nd youth basketball season was completed with participation almost tripling from the 1st season. The players took part in the City of Greer's first ever district basketball all-star tournament with Greer finishing 4th out of 12 teams from all over the upstate.
- Youth wrestling finished the season with 50 – 60 participants on Tuesday and Thursday nights in partnership with Riverside High School. City of Greer hosted duals at Victor Gym and competed in state wide tournaments on the weekends.
- Youth softball, baseball and soccer are currently in season. Soccer completed its Opening Day on March 17th and youth baseball and softball completed their Opening Night on April 13th and Opening Day on April 14th. Approximately 2000 spectators attended the Opening Night event to watch 560 players take the field.
- A 30 and Over Adult Baseball Tournament was hosted at Stevens Field on April 21st and April 22nd.
- Youth tackle and flag football and youth cheer registrations will begin on April 30th for City of Greer residents and on May 7th for people residing outside the city limits of Greer.

- b) **Cultural Arts Division** – Robin Byouk, Cultural Arts Supervisor

- The 2018 Greer goes Global Juried Art Show Reception was held on March 30th. There were twice as many entries as the prior year and approximately 100 in attendance with Mayor Danner presenting the awards. Local restaurants donated all the refreshments.
- Two stages were utilized at the International Festival with 19 different groups performing during the event. Jamarcus Gaston from WSPA Channel 7 emceed the outdoor stage performances and Jessica Candid (GCAC Intern) emceed the inside stage.
- Art classes continued at the Tryon Recreation Center on Tuesdays. Robin Byouk and Sara Odom attended several theatre and art openings in Greenville.
- Two Little Libraries from the Needmore Recreation Center and Victor Gym were repainted.
- The Greer Children's Theatre production of Alice in Wonderland Jr. performances were held February 23-25 and March 2-4 at the Cannon Centre.
- GCAC in conjunction with the Greer High School Art Club provided

- face painting for the Eggstastic Easter event.
- This and That Consignment Shop on Wade Hampton Blvd. donated 500 prom dresses to GCAC for their dress sale on March 25-26 at the Tryon Recreation Center.

Upcoming Events:

- Tall Tale Tuesdays will be held at the Greer Heritage Museum on June 5, 12, 19, 26, July 10, 17, and 24 from 7-8pm each week.
- Greer Idol Season 11 is back and auditions will be held at the Greer Family Fest on May 5 from 1-2pm.
- Tunes in the Park will be June 15, 22, July 6, 13, 20 and 27 with a rain date of August 3. Mac Arnold & Plate Full O'Blues will kick off the series with different genres of music each week.
- Summer Camp at Tryon will be Comic Book Art on June 25-29, Fairy Tale on July 9-13 and Advanced Camp July 16-27. The Advanced Camp will offer 6 free performances at the Cannon Centre in August.

c) **Events Division** – Ashlyn Stone, Events Supervisor

- On February 10th, the Second Annual Bridal Showcase was held at the Events Centers. This event promotes the City of Greer facilities as prime wedding venues. Approximately 100 brides, family and friends visited the showcase to meet local vendors and view the rental spaces.
- The City of Greer 2th Annual International Festival was held on April 14 at Greer City Park. Nearly 6000 guests attended the event with over 150 volunteers from 40+ countries participated in this great event.
- The division is ramping up for over 30 weddings already booked for this summer in addition to dozens of school dances, graduations and large birthday/anniversary parties.

Upcoming Events:

- Food Truck Rollout on May 18th, from 5pm-8pm, including Robino's, Automatic Taco, Smokin' Blues BBQ, Keepin It Fresh, Speckled Cakes and Desserted Isle. Ashlyn thanked Greer CPW for sponsoring this event.
- Moonlight Movies will begin on June 7 (Secret Life of Pets), June 14 (Despicable Me 3), June 21 (Lego Ninjago Movie), June 28 (Emoji Movie), July 5 (Jungle Book; Live Action), July 12 (Smurfs: The Lost Village), July 19 (Cars 3) and July 26 (Coco).
- Freedom Blast will take place on June 30th. The event will kick off at 6pm with a Skydiving Flag Show, followed by our Military Tribute, Texas Roadhouse Rib Eating Contest and J. Dew as the emcee for the evening. The headliner band, The Erica Berg Collective will perform and the Spartanburg County Drill Team will perform a Fallen Heroes Ceremony at 8:35pm. The event concluded with our largest fireworks display to date, which began at 10pm.

- d) **Grounds Division** – Travis Durham, Grounds Maintenance Superintendent
- Replacement of playground equipment was completed at BP Edwards, new tube slides were installed at several facilities.
 - Trees Greenville planted 25 trees at the Disc Golf Course at Century Park.
 - During Hope Week, April 2-7, landscaping was completed at City Park and a rock border wall was installed in the landscape beds at Century Park.
 - Block parties were held at BP Edwards and Victor Park.
 - The rainfall for the quarter was 14.23 inches. Wayne Yount brought to the department's attention a soggy hillside area at Cannon Street just before the sidewalk, Travis Durham will check on this issue. John Bohannon inquired about the Little Libraries at Victor Park and the Needmore Recreation Center. They will be reinstalled after the repairs and new paint have been completed. Marc Metcalf gave kudos to Travis Durham for his great participation in the Leadership Greer program.
- e) **Recreation Division** – Justin Miller, Recreation Supervisor
- The Senior Computer Classes are currently taking place at Greer City Hall Events Center.
 - Summer Camp registrations are complete for the Camp Greer at Victor Gym and a few openings are still available for the Needmore Summer Camp. The camp counselor interviews have been completed and several staff will be returning from last year.
 - Three hard tennis courts at the Tryon Recreation Center have been painted with lines for Pickleball as well as tennis. The courts are currently being reserved for different timeframes to allow the Pickleball participants to use them. Tennis players are now being required to schedule and reserve these courts as well. Discussions with Patrick Wood, Tennis Instructor, are underway for the creation of Pickleball leagues.
 - Walk with Your Elected Official will take place on May 19th with a local physician participating. Council members and Mayor Danner have participated in the past events along with Mr. Driggers and several department heads. John Bohannon, Recreation Association Trustee, has also participated in several walks.
 - Wayne Yount inquired about the dates of the summer camps, which are 8 weeks, June 11 – August 10, with the week of July 2-6 being closed.

VII. Financial Reports – Program Funds – Ann Cunningham, Director

- a) All recreation program funds are on target with their budgeted amounts for the fiscal year. The Victor Park batting cage has been completed and the last remaining project funded through general programming for the fiscal year is the replacement of the restroom vanities at Victor Gym. Quotes are in the process of being obtained as required by procurement.

Grants:

- The Recreational Trails Grant application (\$120,000) was submitted for the Center for the Arts Park Trail with anticipation of hearing the results in the next 2 weeks. This grant is an 80/20 match.
- The Land and Water Conservation Grant application (\$75,000) was submitted to add a restroom facility to HR Turner Park with anticipation of notification of results in early summer. This grant is a 50/50 match.

IX. Director's Report – Ann Cunningham, Director

- a) Data is currently being entered into the new online Civic Rec software system with GIS and General Ledger codes being built and merged into the new system. The new user friendly system will be utilized for ticket sales, rentals and registrations.
- b) Kids Planet Master Plan
Alta Planning + Design of Greenville, SC met with the Kids Planet Master Plan Steering Committee on February 14. The overall scope of the project was outlined and direction was given as to how to proceed with determining a future design of the playground. A subcommittee was created that has visited with children from 6 local elementary schools and gathered input as to what types of playground elements, structures and facilities they would like to have in a renovated site. A Community Drop-In was held in Greer City Hall on April 17th and the public was invited to come and give feedback as to how a new Kids Planet should be designed. Ann requested each trustee complete the survey distributed through social media or by using the QR Code in the upper right corner of the form to access the survey on-line. Data will continue to be collected through May 4th. Alta Planning + Design will analyze the data and then present to the Project Steering Committee for review and further design recommendations. Final revisions will be made with City staff members, followed by a presentation to Greer City Council.
- c) Center for the Arts
This is a Design/Build project and Request for Qualifications for General Contractors is currently being advertised. The process for the 4½ acres involves City Staff, Architects and the General Contractor working together to finalize design of the facility and park to ensure we are getting the best product for our money. All RFQ's are due by 5pm on April 27th. On April 30th the staff will review, rate and recommend the contractor in which to award the project. We anticipate construction to begin this summer.
- d) Bridge at Century Park
Installation of the new pedestrian bridge at Century Park has been completed. Landscaping will be added in the near future. It is such an asset to the park!
- e) Trustee Pictures

- f) Veterans Park – Bricks & Statue Placement
Department staff will be contacting members of the DAV and American Legion to meet in the future at Veterans Park to determine placement of the donated statue and finalize details for the memorial bricks.
- g) American Legion Memorial Day Celebration
The celebration will be held on May 26 10am-6pm at Veterans Park. Food, Pepsi, music, Blood Bank Bus, Flag Burning Ceremony, National Guard, Blue Ridge ROTC and the Spartanburg County Rifle Drill Team will be performing. Two streets, 16th and 17th, will be blocked to traffic. Ann invited the trustees to attend to honor our veterans.
- h) Disc Golf Parking
The disc golf course at Century Park is experiencing issues with lack of parking.
- i) Streetscapes Project, Downtown Greer
Phil Roads, has been hired as the Project Manager. He retired in 2012 as Director, Building and Development Standards Department for the City of Greer. The bid has already been awarded for the paving of the alleyways and parking areas with work to begin in early May. The downtown businesses will have access to new entrances. The actual streetscape project is still in the design phase.
- j) Ann presented the trustees with koozies with the Parks and Recreation Department logo on them.

Monthly Report for April 2018



The 5th Annual International Festival

"Creating Community through People, Parks and Programs"

Department Highlights

- ◆ On April 5, Ann Cunningham and Red Watson, along with the project team from SGA Architecture, attended the PAC meeting at Greer City Hall to review plans for the Center for the Arts renovation project. The Center for the Arts Construction Project is a Design/Build project, and a Request for Qualifications for General Contractors was advertised on April 15. A mandatory pre-submittal meeting for contractors interested in the Center for the Arts renovation was held on April 12, with 13 different companies attending. This process involves city staff, architects and the general contractor working together to finalize design of the facility and park to ensure we are getting the best product for our money. All RFQs were due on April 27. On April 30, the Project Team reviewed and documented the submitted packets from eligible contractors. On May 2, the Project Team will evaluate and rate the contractors and will select contractors to interview.
- ◆ A Kids Planet Master Plan Subcommittee, comprised of city staff and consultants with Alta Planning + Design, was created that visited with children from 6 local elementary schools and gathered input as to what types of playground elements, structures and facilities they would like to have in a renovated site. A Community Drop-In was held in Greer City Hall on April 17 and the public was invited to come and give feedback as to how a new Kids Planet should be designed. Surveys were distributed throughout the city as well as through links on our website and social media. The deadline to complete all surveys is May 4.
- ◆ On April 12, Ann Cunningham, Red Watson, Travis Durham and Brian Wilson participated in a Skype meeting with Kimley-Horn and Associates, Inc, a planning, engineering, and design consulting firm, to review irrigation and landscape designs for the Downtown Streetscape Project.
- ◆ Budget preparations are underway for the department. All department supervisors/coordinators are involved in the process.
- ◆ On April 2, Ann Cunningham and Red Watson toured facilities and reviewed park properties, with South Carolina Parks Recreation and Tourism (SCPRT) staff, that were renovated/purchased with state and federal grant funds.

Department Participation

- ◆ Department staff:
 - Attended planning meetings for Freedom Blast and Greer Family Fest.
 - Participated in the annual Project Pinwheel by placing blue pinwheels in landscaped beds at Greer City Hall, Century Park, Victor Park, and the Needmore Recreation Center. Blue pinwheels are the national symbol for child abuse prevention. The purpose of Project Pinwheel is to celebrate the small things families, neighbors, and community members can do to help keep children safe.

- Participated in Hope Week 2018 during the week of April 2-6 by hosting 2 daily Basketball Camps at the Victor Gym and the Needmore Recreation Center; flower beds were planted at Needmore Recreation Center, Greer City Park and Greer City Stadium; and restrooms were painted at Victor Gym. Community Block Parties were held at Needmore Recreation Center, Victor Gym, and B.P. Edwards Park.
- Attended the second quarter Greer Recreation Association Board meeting held on April 26 at Greer City Hall. Ann Cunningham introduced the new trustee, Amanda Hopper (District 3), to the board.

Division Highlights

Grounds Maintenance

- ◆ Division Staff:
 - Applied new pine straw at Country Club Road Park and new mulch at South Suber Road Park.
 - Built new landscape border rock wall at Century Park.
 - Applied stain and wood sealer to Century Park concession building stairs and deck.
 - Installed new flag pole at the Operations Center.
 - Removed Victor Gym vent insulation panels and installed fan motors.
 - Began removal of ryegrass from South Suber Road Park and Greer City Stadium.
 - Trimmed trees along Trade Street, the Depot parking lot and Greer City Park promenade.
 - Planted annuals at Barnett Bridge.
 - Acquired spring pre-emerge herbicide, fertilizer and fire ant prevention application from Wilson and Associates.
 - Continued to prepare athletic facilities for games and practices.
 - Continued to maintain parks and facilities on a rotational basis.

Athletics:

- ◆ FSCG Academy soccer was facilitated at South Suber Road Park and Greer City Stadium. Academy teams compete Monday, Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday at Greer City Stadium, South Suber Road Park, and various facilities throughout the state and southeast. These teams will complete their season with State Cup tournaments in May.
- ◆ Recreational soccer practices and games were facilitated at South Suber Road Park for U6, U8, U10, and U12 age divisions. Each team played 10 regular season games.
- ◆ A spring break soccer camp was hosted at Greer City Stadium on April 2, 3 and 5 for kids ages 4-13. The soccer academy director, Anthony "Speedy" Solomon, conducted the camp along with several other members of the U18 boys' academy team. Over 50 kids attended the camp throughout the week.
- ◆ Baseball practices were facilitated at Country Club Road Park, Turner Park, Century Park, and Riverside Middle School. Opening Day ceremonies were held on April 13 at Century Park with all of the baseball and girls' softball teams in attendance. Players participated in a homerun contest during the night and teams were introduced. The Speedy Gregory Coach of the Year was awarded to Will Grugan, who opened the 2018 spring season by throwing out the first pitch. Teams took part in pictures on April 14 along with season opening games.
- ◆ Dixie Girls' Softball 8U, 10U, and 12U practices and games were facilitated at Victor Park. Teams competed against district teams from Woodruff, Byrnes and Dorman at Victor Park and Tyger River Park.
- ◆ Cory Holtzclaw attended the District 1 Dixie Youth Baseball meeting on April 6 at Belton-Honea Path Parks and Recreation. Representatives from throughout the upstate met to discuss the upcoming season and rule changes, and to select district tournament sites.
- ◆ Baseball teams attended GBC Night at Blue Ridge High School on April 10. Players were able to meet players and coaches on the high school team, take the field with them and enjoy a fun night supporting one of the local high schools. This was the second high school game that GBC teams attended as they also supported the Greer High School baseball team in March.

Recreation:

- ♦ On April 24, Ann Cunningham, Red Watson and Justin Miller met with Patrick Wood (Tennis Instructor, City of Greer) and Sam Crossland to discuss planning and future use of courts for shared usage between tennis and pickleball.
- ♦ The Recreation Division continued to facilitate the following programs:
 - Senior Action – Needmore Recreation Center, Mondays-Fridays (200 participants monthly)
 - Piano Performers – Cannon Centre, Mondays (220 participants monthly)
 - Never Alone – Tryon Recreation Center, Tuesdays (80 participants monthly)
 - Cutlery Club – Tryon Recreation Center (20 participants monthly)
 - Artifacts Club – Tryon Recreation Center (74 participants monthly)
 - Pickleball – Victor Gym and Tryon Tennis Courts, Mondays-Thursdays (250 participants monthly)
 - Whole Fitness – Victor Gym (60 participants monthly)
 - Senior Whole Fitness – Victor Gym (20 participants monthly)
 - HAM Radio, Beginner and Intermediate Classes – Victor Gym (104 participants monthly)
 - Creative Advancement After School Program – Victor Gym (280 participants monthly)
 - Needmore After School Program – Needmore Recreation Center (100 participants monthly)
- ♦ SOAR (Seniors Out and ARound)
 - Line Dancing Classes were held on April 4, 11, 18 and 25 with an average attendance of 18 seniors.
 - Bingo was held on April 5 and April 19 with an average of 29 members in attendance.
 - On April 9, 16 SOAR members enjoyed watching "Just Getting Started".
 - Lunch Bunch enjoyed a fantastic lunch at Chicken Salad Chick, on April 13, with 13 seniors attending.
 - The monthly Potluck Luncheon was held, on April 17, with 17 SOAR members attending.
 - SOAR rounded out the month with an annual trip to Strawberry Hill USA on April 27. This was a great trip with 29 seniors attending.
 - The average attendance for the month was 20.
- ♦ Senior Computer classes began on April 5 with 20 seniors attending a three-week course on Thursdays at City Hall. At the conclusion of the three-week course, 20 additional seniors will enroll to complete another three-week course that will carry into the month of May.
- ♦ The Needmore Summer Camp continued accepting applications throughout the month.

Cultural Arts:

- ♦ The artwork of Jennifer Mills, local artist, was hung at Greer City Hall.
- ♦ Robin Byouk, Robbie Davis and Ashlyn Stone met with Cammy Lee at Texas Road House to discuss sponsoring summer events. Robin also met with representatives for Fox Carolina social media and The Greenville Journal about sponsorship partnering.
- ♦ The Greer Cultural Arts Council rented costumes and props to Green Charter School, Tigerville Elementary and Woodmont High School.

Events:

- ♦ The Events Division hosted 56 events, at which nearly 9,200 guests visited the City of Greer Events Center.
- ♦ The Parks and Recreation Department hosted the 5th Annual International Festival on April 14 at Greer City Park. This year was the biggest and most exciting yet with over 5,000 people in attendance. The Greer Cultural Arts Council provided 30 volunteers for 10 craft tables.
- ♦ The Events Division is in the process of planning for the following events:
 - Moonlight Movies on Thursdays from June 7 through July 26 at Greer City Park.

Department Highlights
