Minutes of the Council Meeting September 24, 2024

ACTION – Councilmember Jay Arrowood made a motion that the minutes of September 24, 2024 Council Regular Meeting be received as written. Councilmember Mark Hopper seconded the motion.

Special Recognition Greer 76ers Varsity Boys Rugby Team The 2024 South Carolina High School Rugby Union State Champions

Mayor Pro Tempore Wryley Bettis and Greer City Council recognized the Greer 76ers Varsity Boys Rugby Team for their 2024 South Carolina High School Rugby Union State Championship. The team competed hard all season in multiple states playing against some of the best competition in the country. After a tough regular season loss to the Oceanside Collegiate

Sharks the Greer 76ers went back to work, and defeated Oceanside Collegiate in the South Carolina State title rematch. The team then competed in one of the largest Rugby tournaments in the United States called Ruggerfest. During the competition the Greer 76ers defeated the Charlotte Cardinals from North Carolina and St. Edwards from Ohio. After a tough matchup the Greer 76ers eventually fell to Benedictine from Virginia. The team represented Greer, SC well!

Fire Prevention Week In the City of Greer

Mayor Pro Tempore Wryley Bettis and Greer City Council proclaim October 6–12, 2024, as Fire Prevention Week throughout the city, and I urge all the people in City of Greer to make sure their homes have working smoke alarms and to support the many public safety activities and efforts of City of Greer Fire Department.

Andy Merriman, City Administrator presented the following:

Storm Related Events:

Public Services – Employees in Public Services worked 1,719 hours from Friday September 27th to Wednesday October 2nd, clearing trees from power lines, barricading unsafe roads, and clearing more than 3,400 yards of debris.

Fire – On Friday September 27th alone, the Fire department responded to more than 105 calls for service. Saturday through Tuesday they responded to 87 more calls. They evacuated people, secured roads, and assisted with power loss at Pelham Medical Center. Some members deployed with SC Helicopter Aquatic Rescue Team for recues in the Upstate.

Police – The Police department responded to traffic obstructions, damaged property, collisions, and provided emergency transportation. The whole team had to help handle the high call volume. They assisted the Fire Department with evacuations, assisted with blocking roads that had down trees or power lines, and deployed drones to assist with search and rescue.

Building & Development Standards Department - has been working hard to help homeowners and others impacted by damage sustained during the recent storm. The code enforcement and inspection teams are performing damage assessments throughout the city to help determine if homes with damage are safe to live in after sustaining damage. To verify that companies have the proper licenses, bonding, and permits they need to perform work on your home, you can call our Building & Development Standards Department at 864-848-2175.

Response to Storm Damage

Debris cleanup is now underway. Our Public Services Department is working as quickly as it can and in collaboration with SCDOT, Greenville County, Spartanburg County, and FEMA on continued cleanup. Homeowners and renters can apply for FEMA assistance through

DisasterAssistance.gov, the FEMA App, or by calling 800-621-3362. We do have laptops available at City Hall for the community to use for FEMA applications.














Zoning Reviews Monthly Comparison

Residential Construction Costs





Commercial Construction Costs





Total Construction Costs





PROJECT DEVELOPMENTS – John Goughneour and Lindsey James

- The Suber Road Fire Station project is nearly complete. A grand opening was held on September 18th, and staff moved into the building at the beginning of October. Only minor punch items and the generator start up remain.
- The original scope of the Greer Golf Clubhouse renovation project is complete. The additional scope for the kitchen upfit is wrapping up, and full project completion is imminent.
- Construction is nearing completion at the Turner Field Improvement Project. A Certificate of Completion for the
 restroom was issued in early October, and the grading closeout inspection is scheduled for October 11th. Full
 project completion is expected by the end of this month.
- The test repair for the Cannon Centre Deck was approved and full project has been awarded to Sossamon Construction. Repairs are scheduled for October 14-25.

- The Recycle Center Demolition project was approved by Council on September 10th. D.H. Griffin is the awarded contractor, with demolition scheduled to begin near the end of October.
- The Bay Floor Resurfacing Project at Fire Department Headquarters is currently in construction. The project is scheduled to be completed by October 11th.
- The SDP and PRA for the Police and Fire Training Facility have been submitted for review and first round of comments have been returned. MPS/Stantec are working to address all comments and resubmit. The permit for the septic tank has been issued by DES.
- The Depot Street Garage project is nearing the end of design phase. Construction Drawings are nearly complete, and finish selections are ongoing.
- The City Hall Employee Entrance Drain Project has been awarded to Babb's Plumbing and Backflow. The City of Greer's Public Services department will repour the sidewalk once the drain is installed. Work is scheduled to begin October 21st.

Facilities Maintenance Developments – William Bulot and Michael Paulson

- Fleet Shop Expansion The final steps of installing the electrical, water and air drops were completed to allow for full operation.
- Incinerator Fence All bids were received, we are ready to proceed with the install as soon as demolition in the area and grading are completed.
- OC Emergency Lights During a power outage in August, it was realized that several emergency lights, exit lights and spot lights weren't working properly. All defective lights have been replaced or repaired.
- Kid's Planet water line break The main line supplying Century Park experienced a break on our side of the meter, it was quickly repaired. As the pressure was being released back onto the service line, it broke again on the CPW side. They successfully made repairs and Public Services repaired the damage to the grounds from the water flow.
- City Hall Employee Entrance We have a plan to install a trench drain in the sidewalk at the lowest point. The contractor will demo the sidewalk, excavate, tap the pipe below
- Turner plumbing leaks were discovered on the supply and drain lines. The drain line has a break and the supply line to the new restrooms is leaking in the wall. The GC is making repairs but has not completed them. Big Turner custodial duties were added to the list of responsibilities for Reggie.
- Completed warranty repairs at Greer relief except for the sensor lights in two areas that sporadically malfunction. Spearman is trying to narrow down the cause.
- The custodians successfully assisted with Renaissance Faire.
- Elevator hydraulic cylinder leak was repaired by Schindler Elevator.

ADMINISTRATION:

Wards Creek Trail System

• The City of Greer's attorney is continuing to work on acquiring the right-of-way for a trail extending from Biblebrook Drive to Greenleaf Drive. Once this is resolved, we will resume moving forward with the development of this phase.

South Tyger River Greenway

City staff is in the process of creating an RFQ to advertise for qualified contractors in early 2025.

Victor Park

- On Wednesday, September 18, the outdoor basketball court goals were dismantled and relocated to the Operations Center for storage. These were the last pieces of property scheduled to be removed before the sale of Victor Park.
- The closing date on the sale of the property was September 26, 2024.

Turner Ball Park

- On September 16, we celebrated the opening of Big Turner Field to begin our fall softball season. Mayor
 Danner and Councilman Bettis welcomed everyone to our newly renovated field and thanked the
 community for their support in improving this great facility. Our four softball teams started the season
 by each having representatives throw out the first pitch together.
- Keck & Wood continues to monitor all construction administration efforts to complete this project for the remaining portion of the park.
- The following outstanding items will need to be addressed before construction is final: sod installation, top-dressing for commons areas, plumbing, and debris removal.
- The parking islands and retention pond sod installation are expected to take place the latter part of this month.
- The installation of pour-in-place safety surfacing at our playground was completed on September 21. Fencing around the playground is expected to be completed within the next two weeks.

Greer Golf - Clubhouse and Pool Area Renovation

 The remaining equipment installation started the week of September 16 and is expected to conclude on September 23. Following completion, we will call for an inspection and obtain our Certificate of Occupancy.

Athletics

- The Greer 76ers Varsity Boys Rugby season is now underway, with teams participating in the North Carolina Rugby Union Fall 7s League
 - The Greer 76ers High School Boys Tier 2 team went 3-0 during the first weekend of play.
 - The Fall 7s season serves as a valuable training period for new players in preparation for the Greer Christmas 7s tournament and the official South Carolina High School Rugby 15s season.
 Greer is aiming to return to the state title game during the 2024-2025 season.
- Athletic Program Registrations
 - o Tomahawk Youth Wrestling: Registration runs from September 30 to November 2, and space is limited for K5 through 6th grade. Participants must be 6 years old by November 1, 2024.
 - o Greer 76ers Rugby U12 Tackle roster is now full, marking the first season for U12 tackle.
 - Greer 76ers Rugby U10 Tackle roster is still open for registration as it enters its second season.
 - o Greer 76ers Varsity Boys Spring 15s registration is underway
- Greer PRT will host junior tackle rugby events for the first time in the program's history, made possible
 with assistance from the North Carolina Rugby Union and partners in the Charlotte area. The first event
 is scheduled for January 18th at Country Club Park and will feature players aged 6-12 years old.
- Greer 76ers Varsity Boys Tier 1 and Tier 2 teams are registered for the Greer Christmas 7s Tournament, which will be hosted by Greer PRT from December 6-8, 2024, at Country Club Park. The tournament is currently half-full and on track to be the largest event to date.

- Greer Adult Baseball Program: Competitions took place every night of the week at Stevens Field.
- Greer PRT Softball League: Practices and games began at their new home, Turner Park.
- Greer 76ers Varsity Boys Rugby: The team continued its regular practice schedule at Century Park and Country Club Park.

Cultural Arts

- Staff hung the Hispanic/Latino Heritage Art exhibition at the Center for the Arts. The art reception was rescheduled from October 1 to October 22, due to the hurricane.
- Staff worked on logistics for the GCT production of Wizard of Oz, the Day of the Dead festival, and the Hispanic/Latino Art reception.
- Clay classes and after-school art classes are ongoing. Two new clay instructors will start in October.
- Greer Children's Theatre (GCT) hosted a meeting for parents and the cast of Wizard of Oz at the Tryon Recreation Center on Saturday, October 5. Costuming and rehearsals took place at the Tryon Recreation Center on both Saturday and Sunday. The play is set to open on October 25.

Events

- Despite Hurricane Helene, the events division hosted the majority of the scheduled rentals. This was largely due to the assistance of the Public Services Department and the Facilities Department. Thank you to those who helped ensure these rentals could take place.
- Unfortunately, Railfest, which was scheduled for Saturday, September 28, was canceled, and we are unable to reschedule this event.
- Throughout September, the Ambassadors provided excellent customer service, assisting over 950 passengers in downtown Greer Station.
- 68 total events- Internal: 29, Rental: 25, Special Events: 7, Wedding Events: 5. A total of 32,000 guests visited the City of Greer Events Center.
- The Ambassadors have continued to provide excellent customer service to 800 passengers in downtown Greer Station in the month of September.



Golf

- Greer Golf was closed from September 27 through October 4 due to Hurricane Helene. All staff worked
 on the course to remove debris and get the course back to a playable condition. Approximately 40 trees
 fell that had to be removed.
- We have made a recommendation and are in the hiring process of filling the vacant Groundskeeper 1
 position.
- White Wine & Butter is working towards completing all City obligations to occupy the dining room and kitchen. We are waiting to get an updated opening date from them.
- Revenue for September was \$107,691.37. This is approximately \$5,000 more than last year's revenue for September (\$102,761.29). Fiscal year to date, we have collected \$371,318.11 in revenue. This is approximately \$13,000 more than last year.
